A message from the President of Iceland to staff in commerce, tourism and related sectors

Dear shop and commercial staff, tourism staff, and those in other services,

I send you our warmest greetings. I wish those who are now experiencing illness a good recovery. And I also send sincere greetings to those who are now in preventive quarantine.

Here in Iceland various measures have been introduced in response to the viral pandemic which now rages around the world. Restrictions have been placed on travel, and on numbers of people in shops, restaurants, and so on. And now more stringent rules have taken effect regarding social distancing in general. No longer can we go about our business when it suits us, travel around at will, or enjoy social gatherings.

These new requirements have had a heavy impact upon people in the commercial sector; and the tourist sector, which has been rapidly expanding in recent years, is now vulnerable.
